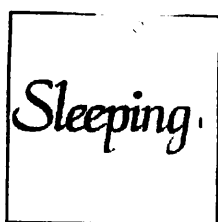


"20-QUESTIONS"; A selection of 20 of the best questions from the last 30 years (at least we thought so)
